Sobriety Checkpoints

Forensic Tests for Alcohol (919) 707-5250 (Program is run by Steve Morgart 707-5261) has 6 BAT mobiles available to set up sobriety checkpoints. This service is free. They will come to the grantees address, will set up, will give officers a briefing on procedures, will do the paperwork.

FTA also has a training program on DWI checkpoints.

Training Law Enforcement Officers

The Conference of DAs (Dale Morill 919 890-1500) can set up local meetings with law enforcement officers and assistant district attorneys. Kim Overton is his assistant. He is the Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor.

Portable Breath Testing Devices

Call FTA 919 707 5250. They will provide these to officers, provide them with training. MADD no longer provides this service.

Funding Opportunities through Governor's Highway Safety Program

GHSP does not fund officer overtime. But will provide funding for DWI checkpoint trailers. Can apply to Frank Hackney at 919 733-3083.

Grants are also available for select projects. These can pay for officers to do DWI enforcement and also buy them needed equipment. Call 919 733-3083.

Teaching Responsible Alcohol Use

“Teaching Responsible Alcohol Use” FE Warren Air Force Base, Cheyenne, Wyoming Alcohol problems in the military are not unlike those in the general population. And the consequences, ranging from lost productivity, accidents, assault, domestic violence to problem drinking and alcoholism are very similar. When Col. Evan Hoapili took over as Base Commander, he was determined to tackle the issue and made it his top priority. He used a responsible drinking model of 0-0-1-3. Zero for underage drinking, zero for DUIs, one drink per hour max and three drinks in a night max. Find out how this model was integrated into the population, how life at FE Warren has significantly changed and how a responsible drinking model can dramatically reduce the problems associated with the use and abuse of alcohol consumption. Here’s one example – underage drinking was slashed by 81%!
